The AGM of St Martin's Church, already reeling from a generous legacy from Jill Lacey of £10,000, was amazed to receive a donation from her husband Frank of £23,000 with the promise of a further £7,000 to come

The promise has been kept and the Church now has £40,000 to spend. Frank Lacey, knowing the state of the stonework in parts of the Church, requested that most of it go towards repairs to the tower. The stonework round the windows is crumbling and the pinnacles need attention. There are leaks from the roof, threatening the electrical installations and the beams holding the bells also need examining. £40,000 sounds a lot but the amount of work to be done will soon swallow it (All Saints at Sixhill has had almost twice that amount spent on its tower). has enable arrangements to begin immediately. Marcus Edmundson has already been in touch with Diocesan architects and states: "Our appointed Architect, Mr Philip Hawkins, succeeded in completing the Specification, Schedule of Work and Drawing before going on holiday. This has allowed us to send all the relevant papers to the Secretary of the Diocesan Advisory

Board. It has been confirmed that the DAC will consider this at their meeting to be held on May 25th and make their recommendations to the Archdeacon. We hope that these recommendations will give us the go ahead to apply for the Faculty which is required before the repair work can proceed."

Mr Hawkins will also be told that we may wish to restore the wheels and bells because there is a possible source of money to do so.

The Church Meeting went on to reappoint Marcus Edmundson as Chairman and Virginia Knivett as Treasurer and elected Paul Cutts as Secretary. Ray Butler had been the long-time Secretary and the meeting thanked her for her many years of service. Kay Donocik will be Treasurer of the Churchyard Fund.

“Belmont Starts Tests Next Month”

Lincolnshire’s television reception troubles will soon be over .The new transmitting station being built at Belmont, near Louth, by the Independent Television Authority-for joint use by the BBC-will start test transmissions at the end of the month.”

Belmont Transmitter is a television and radio mast situated in the parish of south Willingham. It is owned by Arquiva. Constructed in 1965 with a height of 1,265

The Chairman reported on the progress in underpinning the Hall (The Engineer is preparing the paperwork ready for the builder to start) and gave an account of a successful year. The Accounts registered the same – apart from the generous legacy of £10,000 from Jill Lacey we have about £16,000 in the bank (£13,000 when the current equipment programme is complete).

The new Committee was elected. Tina

Speck and Paul Fuller did not stand and Jan Crouch and James Miller were elected in their place. The rest of the Committee was re-elected (and at the subsequent Committee Meeting, Mel Montgomery was re-elected Chairman, Fran Kingsley, Secretary and James Miller, Treasurer with John Sturgeon remaining as Deputy Treasurer). The Chairman expressed his appreciation for all the work the Committee does through the year – and for the wine and nibbles provided.
